TEACHING RESPONSIBILITIES & PHILOSOPHY

I started teaching at the University of New Mexico in 1996, teaching a wide variety of sociology courses while finishing my Ph.D. These courses included both lower and upper division courses, from Introductory Sociology to Classic and Contemporary Social Theory. The teaching experience gained from such a wide variety of classes encouraged me to be creative in developing curricula materials appropriate for each class so that the students were exposed to the best and most current content available. Courses ranged from 130 students in large introductory courses to 30 students in advanced classes. These courses included:
